

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# Out of China

## Focusing on a Changing Economy, Anticipating a Presidential Visit

With Chinese President Jiang Zemin slated to visit the United States on Tuesday, an interview with him by Mike Wallace of CBS News, airing Sunday at 7 on "60 Minutes," and a 90-minute PBS documentary examining China's journey toward a market economy are the pick of this week's offerings.

The documentary, "In Search of China," is executive produced by Robert Lawrence Kuhn and produced by Adam Zhu, who gained unprecedented access to Chinese citizens and institutions. Kuhn also wrote "Made in China: Voices of the New Economic Revolution."

The program, a WETA production made with the cooperation of China Central Television, will air Friday at 9.

The story begins with Deng Xiao Ping, who took over the reins of China two decades ago and began a series of market reforms that included encouraging mergers and acquisitions, privatization, entrepreneurship and restructured businesses. His strategy—to loosen economic constraints while retaining political control—has had a dramatic impact on the country.

Among those featured in this program are Yang Millionaire, a highly successful stock market player who shares his investment strategies; Wang Hai, CEO of the country's largest shoe company; Zhao Qizheng, minister of information, who talks of China's need for stability and technology police; and Yan Mingfu, Mao's Russian translator and a Communist leader who was fired for sympathizing with students in Tiananmen Square but who now heads China's largest charity.

The success stories include a group of students behind a Beijing dot-com who seek investment funds for their Internet
